hen current and future students enter North Lake College's Welcome Center in the A-Building, they receive instruction on how to take advantage of the many services available in the A-400 area.

They can access information through computer kiosks, locate various departments or receive individual reports required for them to proceed to the advising and registration area in the main lobby.

After checking in, students can proceed to Room A-415 and sign in for assistance from an advisor.

If students are eligible to self-register, they may be directed to the self-registration area in Room A-417. Registered students will need to visit the college's cashiers who work just down the hall from the advising and admissions area.

If students require testing for either TSI or skills identification, they can visit the Testing Center in Room A-425. This is also where a student ID card can be issued. Photos are required, smiles are optional and hats and caps may not be worn when the photograph is taken.

DISABILITY SERVICES

Where There is a Will, There Usually is a Way

he Disability Services Office (DSO) coordinates accommodations to enable students with disabilities and/or special requirements to participate fully in the educational experiences available at North Lake College.

Students with physical, psychological, sensory or learning disabilities might be eligible for services and/or accommodations through the Disability Services Office. Students receive individual academic advising, registration and career guidance.

Accommodations are co-

ordinated to fit the individual needs of the student, including textbooks on tape, reader/scribe services, sign language interpreters, computer-aided, real-time translation (CART), note-taking, special testing arrangements, the use of specialized adaptive equipment or technology, loan of specialized equipment and large print materials.

Extensive information and referral services are also available.



orth Lake College has a thriving International student population representing more than 80 countries. Low out-of-country tuition and small classes help make North Lake a great place to pursue your education.

The International Student Services Center offers services to students who were born outside the United States or whose native language is a language other than English.

The center is located in Room A-418. Academic Student Advising is available on a walk-in basis during business hours; International Student Advising is available by appointment only.

The International Student Services Center is open Monday through Thursday from 8:30 a.m. to 7 p.m., Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., and Saturday from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. The center's "F-1 Advisers" are not available on Saturday.

A-428 RISING STAR OFFERS AID

Transition To College Made Easier for High School Seniors

he Rising Star Program (Room A-428) provides qualified high school graduates with financial assistance and academic support services to attend any college in the Dallas County Community College District.

The program provides up to \$4,000 for tuition and books. Every year the Foundation makes more than 1,500 scholarship awards totaling several hundred thousand dollars.

The DCCCD Foundation is governed by a board of local business and civic leaders that represent a virtual "who's who" of not only Dallas, but national and even international leadership.

Students enrolled in the Rising Star Program receive individual academic support such as academic advising, tutoring, transfer assistance and help completing the financial aid process. They also participate in various community service activities.

To qualify for Rising Star, a graduating high school senior must have:

• attended a Dallas County public high school or Dallas CAN! Academy.

• met eligibility guidelines for financial assistance.

• graduated in the top 40 percent of their class OR had a "B" average OR passed the required skills assessment exam before enrolling in college classes.

You have until November 1 in the same year you graduate from high school to be considered for eligibility.

The Rising Star Scholarship Program is supported by the DCCCD Foundation. The foundation promises students that if they stay in high school, graduate, demonstrate a modest level of academic potential and have specific financial need, then the foundation will guarantee them the chance to earn a two-year college education.

Dual Credit Courses Motivate Minors

Advanced High School Students Earn College Credit

growing number of academically prepared and motivated high school students are stepping up to earn college credit before they even graduate from high school. North Lake College helps make this possible with dual credit courses and concurrent enrollment.

Dual credit courses can be taught on NLC's Central Campus or at a high school that partners with North Lake.

The benefit to high school juniors and seniors is exposure to a challenging curriculum that helps prepare them for future college work while also satisfying their high school curriculum. Dual Credit students receive credit at both the high school and college levels.

In addition to dual credit partnerships with Irving and Coppell Independent School Districts and Cistercian Prep School, North Lake has also partnered with the North Hills School and the University School of Las Colinas. A growing number of home-schooled students take Dual Credit classes, as well.

Concurrent Enrollment Concurrent Enrollment differs from Dual Credit in that students receive college credit only. High school students are able to pursue their goals through a variety of academic, technical and vocational interests.

Dual Credit and Concurrent Enrollment high school students must meet the same qualifications as any other NLC student. High school students must have a letter of recommendation from their high school counselor.

A-430 FEDERAL GRANT YIELDS SUCCESS

First Generation College Students Coached by Trio Staff

The TRiO program provides support to students who are motivated and serious about obtaining an education. The staff works with students to provide realistic planning, transfer information and academic advisement.

TRiO is a federally funded grant program where students qualify to receive support services. The two eligibility requirements are: 1) first generation college student (neither parent earned a bachelor degree), and 2) financial need (based on number of people in the household and



annual income).

All of TRiO's services are free to those who qualify, and the program specializes in one-on-one English, math and science tutoring, academic advisement, transfer information, scholarships, financial aid assistance, study skill workshops, and college tours.

Upward Bound <u>Shows the Way</u> Local High School Students Exposed to College Life

The goal of the Upward Bound program, now in its seventh year at North Lake College, is to prepare students who might not otherwise have the chance to attend college.

The TRiO Upward Bound program recruits students in grades 9 to 11 who attend The Academy or Irving, MacArthur and Nimitz high schools.

The program is limited to 50 participants and provides free afterschool tutoring during spring and fall semesters, academic advising for high school curriculum and college admissions and social and academic enrichment workshops. The group meets one Saturday every month during the fall and spring.

Students are taught effective time management and study skills, test-

taking strategies, career exploration and more.

Upward Bound works closely with high school instructors and counselors to help determine which students qualify for the program. A six-week summer session is offered at North Lake College.

Instructors are hired to teach critical skills in math, science, English Language Arts and foreign languages to prepare participants for their next academic year.

The program also provides a T-shirt and all meals during the week, including field trips.

On Fridays, students visit cultural and educational sites.

A-425 TESTING YOUR KNOWLEDGE

Testing Center Available for All Your Test-Taking Needs

North Lake College Testing Center administers assessment tests, instructional exams and national program exams. The center also offers credit-by-exam (CLEP and DANTES) opportunities. The center is equipped with separate stations for both computerized and paper-and-pencil tests. Private rooms are available for special accommodations by appointment only. The Testing Center is located in Building A, 4th floor, A-425.

During exams, students may only take a scantron, calculator and a pencil or pen into the testing area. Free lockers are available to store belongings while taking a test.

New students can also obtain their North Lake student ID cards in the Testing Center. A photograph is required, and hats are not allowed.

The Discover Test focuses on interests, abilities and values and is designed for students who have not decided on a major.

The Myers-Briggs Type Indicator gives information on your personality and suggests careers that people with

your personality tend to pursue and careers that people with your personality tend not to pursue.

The SIGI program helps students gauge their aptitude and values for a field they may have already been considering.

The center has a computer template for resumés, and mock interviews are held to develop skills.

Career Planning and Placement Specialists offer individual assistance with all aspects of the job search process.

The Career Services Center is open 8:30 a.m. to 7 p.m., Monday through Thursday, and 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., on Fridays. Appointments are not necessary but are encouraged. Career Services is located in Room A-337.

Family Education Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA)

For students with privacy concerns

Students may request that directory information, except name and verification of enrollment status, be withheld from the public by giving written notice to the Admissions/Registrar's Office during the first 12 class days of a fall or spring semester or the first four class days of a summer session.

If a student does not provide written notification to the Admissions/Registrar's Office, any person may make a written request for directory information and the information will be disclosable. No telephone requests will be accepted. **Student Rights:** (source: U.S. Department of

Education)
• The right to inspect and review the

student's education records within 45 days of the day the University receives a request for access.

• The right to request the amendment of the student's education records that the student believes are inaccurate, misleading, or otherwise in violation of the student's privacy rights under FERPA.

• The right to provide written consent before the university discloses personally identifiable information from the student's education records, except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure without consent.

• The right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by the University to comply with the requirements of FERPA.



Requirements for Candidacy:

· Candidate must have an overall GPA of 2.5 or greater on a 4.0 scale.

· Candidate must be enrolled in at least six credit hours at North Lake College.

· Candidate, if elected, must be prepared to serve and represent the Student Body of North Lake College as requested and needed throughout the campus, the Dallas County Community College District, and the Texas Region.

· Candidate is required to attend weekly SGA meetings.

· Candidate must not be on either scholastic or academic probation.

• For President or Vice President officer position (upon successful election to the position), candidate may not be serving as a president or vice president of another club or organization while serving his or her term of office.

Officer Election Campaign Week will be held Tuesday, Sept. 5 through

all candidates will be held Friday and Saturday, Sept. 15 and 16. All students may log on under eConnect in order to submit their vote.

All Student Body officer positions are to be obtained by a sponsored campaign and registered election. The S.P.A.R. office has campaign guidelines available. Adherence to these guidelines will demonstrate the leadership skills and integrity of each candidate.

How to Get Involved with Service Learning

I. Select the agency with which you would like to serve.

Consult with your instructor about choosing a site that not only matches your interests, but that will help you meet your learning goal. Please note that some agencies have a higher requirement of hours to participate. You must meet the agency's requirements to receive college credit. **II. Fill out the enrollment form and release of liability obtained from your instructor or campus coordinator.**

You won't be able to go forward until the enrollment form is completed.

III. Take the enrollment form and release to

the campus service learning coordinator. IV. Contact your selected agency and get started.

• Do not wait until late in the semester to begin your service.

• Some sites require 3-4 weeks just to process your application.

• Orientation time does not count toward required hours.

V. Document your time and follow through on your commitment.

• Give a minimum of 15 hours in service during the semester. If your instructor or placement site has a higher minimum, you must complete the requirement for credit.

• Pick up a DCCCD Service Learning time sheet from your instructor or Service Learning coordinator. You and your site supervisor need to sign off on your hours.

Follow through with the chosen schedule to which you commit. If for any reason you are unable to complete your commitment, you must notify your site supervisor, instructor, and campus Service Learning coordinator as soon as possible.
You must return any credentials or volunteer jacket issued to you.

Return your time sheet to your Service Learning campus coordinator by Nov. 30, 2006.

Informal Complaints

A new method of taking the pulse of North Lake students is the use of the "listening box" (pictured).

North Lake College President Herlinda Glasscock fosters openness on campus, and the listening box campaign is a way to gather input from the entire campus community, process questions and concerns and distribute answers back to the campus community.

Listening boxes are stationed around the NLC campus and everyone, including staff and faculty, may fill out a form and insert it into the box. Concerns and questions of all types can be raised. Peo-

ple who include their name and contact information can get a direct response, in addition to the distributed response.

Formal Complaints

Students who wish to pursue a formal complaint process will find well established guidelines to use.

A complaint can be filed initiating a formal investigation by the college's administration.

A "complaint" is an issue that is impor-

tant to the student but does not rise to the level of a "grievance" as defined in the Student Code of Conduct.

In these circumstances, students can do one of two things: They can leave a written complaint at the SPAR office for the president of the Student Government Association (SGA). From there, the SGA president will pursue the matter using appropriate administrative channels, or written complaints may also be filed with any dean or vice president. They will investigate the complaint and, if necessary, refer the student to an appropriate person on the college staff.

Whomever formally investigates the complaint will be responsible for communication with the student within 30 days of the complaint.







Print Journalism

Students exploring journalism at NLC get hands-on experience while working on the campus newspaper, the *News-Register*. It was recognized in 2004 as one of the top 25 college newspapers in the nation. In 2006, the publication was ranked one of the top six in Texas.

Students are responsible for the layout, content, editing, design and distribution of the monthly newspaper, and also produce a literary magazine and a campus guide, annually.

A faculty advisor guides the production process, advises and coaches student editors and represents the college's publications policies in the newsroom, while observing basic First Amendment tenets and journalism principles.

The paper is produced nine times a year on Mac workstations using In-Design, Photoshop, Illustrator and Acrobat.

Classes available each year in-

clude Introduction to Mass Communication, News Gathering and Writing I & II and News Publications.

Video Technology

CENTRALCAMPUS WHERE IT ALL BEGAN

Since 1977, North Lake College has had a formidable presence in its Irving/Las Colinas neighborhood. Beginning with 276 acres of land, a college was built with a goal to blend architecture and nature. Architect Joe Guthrie designed North Lake's buildings to house solar panels, but they were deemed too expensive to install and operate. Construction, growth and expansion have continued through the years, and the MacArthur Blvd. campus now includes 571,000 squarefeet of building space and more is on the way.

The Central Campus will eventually host a DART light-rail stop and will include several new buildings. A voter-approved bond package funds the expansion.

DFW Center

Education at the Airport

orth Lake College and the Construction Education Foundation (CEF) provide industry-driven training for construction workers in North Texas.

The DFW Education Center is the culmination of that partnership. The center is a renovated 60,000 sq. ft. facility that represents an investment of \$1.5 million by the college and participating construction companies in the Dallas/Ft. Worth area.

Courses were developed to provide the technical knowledge and hands-on skills for students to find career opportunities in the residential, commercial, and industrial construction industry.

The center houses classrooms, laboratories, NLC faculty offices and CEF foundation offices. NLC offers training in construction management, construction technology, masonry, plumbing, commercial heating and air conditioning, and glazing.

The DFW Education Center is located at 1401 Royal Lane West, DFW Airport. It is near the airport, off the Freeport exit from 114, and the phone number is 972-860-7873.

South Irving Center

A Neighborhood College

The South Irving Center, a nine-year-old satellite campus of North Lake College, is currently located in the City of Irving Human Services Building near Irving Blvd., at 440 South Nursery Road, Suite 100.

Among the courses offered at the neighborhood college are computer instruction, GED testing and preparation in English and Spanish, GMAT and GRE preparation, Workforce English classes, dance classes and Defensive Driving.

Students may use the computer lab to complete assignments, check e-mail, or search for jobs when a class is not in session.

Executive Dean René Castilla and his staff provide assistance with registration for GED, Workforce English advising, as well as referring students to the appropriate divisions for further information.



EMERGENCY EVACUATION

North Lake College is equipped with a campus-wide alarm and notification system. Throughout campus you will see alarms like the one pictured above.

1. A loud repetitive buzzer signals exterior evacuation. Leave the room immediately and go outside. Walk away from the building to a distance of at least 300 feet.

2. A steady buzzing tone signals the need for an interior evacuation. Leave the room immediately, but do not leave the building. Go to a designated emergency shelter inside the campus.

Shelters for interior evacuation:

P-Building (lowest floor, down from the Gallery): P-207, P-213 and P-219 (classrooms down and across from Mail Room/ Print Shop), P-235, P-239 (Make-up Lab and Arena Theatre), P-249 (Choir Room), P-250 Television/AV Studio).

T-Building: T-114, T-148 (Classrooms), and T-123 (Conference Room).

F-Building: F-102 (Girl's Locker Room), F-106 (Weight Room.)

Library: Basement.

Campus police will signal "All Clear" for you to return from an interior evacuation.

Speed Limits

The speed limit on college roadways is 20 mph. In parking lots, it is reduced to 10 mph. **Accidents**

If you are involved in an accident, contact the North Lake College Police immediately. The police department will dispatch emergency responders when necessary.

Parking Areas

Parking for students, staff, faculty, and visitors is located on the north and south sides of the campus. Students may not park in areas designated as reserved parking or faculty/staff parking lot. Parking for disabled individuals is available in posted designated areas. Vehicles parking in these spaces must clearly display the appropriate placards, decals or license plates.

Parking in the "T" Drive area is prohibited at present. Barricades have been placed across the roadway to curtail vehicle traffic in this area, as it is a staging site for construction projects. Campus police will monitor the "T" Drive. Reserved parking areas are posted with signage and are enforced. Areas such as the Reserved Facility Vendor Parking, Police Parking, Senior Parking, and loading areas are consistently monitored. Contact the police department for further information.

Parking Violations

The campus police issue citations for violation of college parking policies, including parking in loading zones, fire lanes, restricted areas, on the grass, in stripped zones, in walkways or roadways, double parking, and parking in reserved areas without a decal. Reserved parking spaces for administrators, faculty and staff are marked with signage.

Parking Decals

Parking decals are available in the police department office (C-204). Parking decals are not required for students. However, you are encouraged to get a student decal to assist the staff in identifying the driver of your car in the event of an emergency, accident, etc.


